Often times when everyone is watching the kids; that means no one is watching the kids. There should always be someone designated to watch the kids, especially when they're around water.

Pick up a Water Watcher tag at our front desk, and pledge to be a Water Watcher. This means, making sure all kids are being 'watched' while in or around the water.

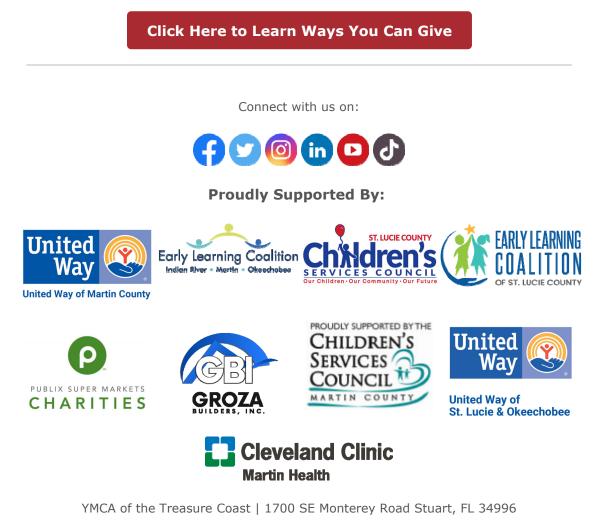
